

At our 183rd Annual Meeting, Moderator Sandy Polarek reflected gratefully on the breadth of activities and ministries our congregation is undertaking. We are truly a vibrant congregation, with meaningful outreach and inreach, worship and education, investment and creativity. What a blessing to be yoked together to live out the message of God's healing, transforming love!

In my reflection, I noted what I consider to be one of the greatest sins of 20th and 21st century Christianity—the underutilization of our buildings, which for most churches, is their largest temporal asset. I am grateful that, together with our Minister of Faith Formation and Community Engagement, Jon Pahl, one of my significant goals for 2019 is the more robust stewardship of our space. The WI Conference UCC has given us a Catalyst Grant which will help to transition the space that has most recently been the YCA room into shared workspace for small startup nonprofits. The idea is to leverage our underutilized space for good while bringing in both new people through our doors and new revenue through our books. With the creative design skills of Ben VerGiesen, a combination of volunteer and skilled labor, and a small additional investment by the congregation, this nonprofit incubator will both help Union's financial footing while also continuing our long tradition of being a springboard for local social service organizations.

This need for innovative, nontraditional revenue streams is going to continue to be important to Union as we navigate the financial waters of the coming years. Outgoing Treasurer Jeff Carels noted at the Annual Meeting that between donor designated gifts and fundraisers in 2018 not only did we raise over \$13,000 toward our \$19,000 budget deficit, members also donated \$9,800 more than they pledged. This allowed us to only utilize \$11,000 from our cash surplus which remained from years past, a surplus we've been

carrying for a couple of years because of being understaffed. While we do have some surplus available again, those present at the Annual Meeting voted unanimously to pass a budget which includes a \$38,000 deficit this year. What that means is that we are going to continue to need to give extravagantly beyond our pledges, that both established fundraisers such as the Silent Auction and the Christmas Tree and Wreath Sale need our robust support, and that we will need to continue to develop additional creative ways to fund the financial needs of our ministries.

Of course, all of this is for the purpose of sharing the extravagant, inclusive, healing, transforming love of God in Jesus Christ that is Union. With Jon now firmly on the ground, our ministry of Community Engagement is poised for growth, both in influence and members, but he cannot shoulder this alone. By virtue of being a member of Union, I trust that you believe in God's work being done through us. If 2019 is going to be a year of growth, it will be because we have all embodied the Gospel passage I preached on just before the Annual Meeting, where Jesus reads from the Prophet Isaiah, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:18-19)

May growth in our ministry flourish in the coming year.

## Union Library: Towering Figures

Here are four stunning picture book biographies executed in a large format with arresting illustration as befits these towering figures.


"Every great dream begins with a dreamer." *Moses: When Harriet Tubman led her people to freedom* by Carole Boston Weatherford and illustrated by Kadir Nelson. The author's voice carries us into Tubman's fears and prayers as she travels north out of slavery in her first of many such journeys. For children who would dare greatly, this story is a model

of courage and trust in God to be with them. Tubman's faith births a sense of justice that molds her into a dedicated and strategic way finder.

"It always seems impossible until it's done." *Nelson Mandela* written and illustrated by Kadir Nelson. No modern life better illustrates the cost and the value of keeping the faith. Mandela was educated with the support of the United Methodist Church, and drew strength from Thembu chiefs and his ancestors. The spare narrative moves swiftly through Mandela's life as a lawyer, activist, prisoner and president. The compelling pictures show his passion, character and generous spirit.

"Truth is powerful and it prevails." *So Tall Within: Sojourner Truth's Long Walk toward Freedom* by Gary D. Schmidt and illustrated by Daniel Winter. Sojourner Truth was born Isabella Baumfree, the daughter of slaves in upstate New York. She walked away from her masters and asked for shelter at a house inhabited by Quakers. Learning that her son had been taken illegally out of state, she confronted his owners feeling "so tall within, I felt like the power of a nation was with me." Though they shut the door in her face, she argued successfully in court and her son was returned to her. Truth was a tall, commanding presence, with a surprising confidence instilled by a righteous anger and her deep, early experiences of God and Jesus.

"In a gentle way you can shake the world" *Grandfather Gandhi* by Arun Gandhi and Bethany Hegedus and illustrated by Evan Turk. The central event in this true experience is unusual for a picture book because it is about anger. Anger can be a lightning strike or channeled like electricity, Gandhi counsels his contrite grandson who fears he has not lived up to his family's principle of peace. The use of anger to make change is a powerful secret of successful social moments and it is presented clearly for a young audience in this book.

Here’s how Howe is described on the website:


