

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Hanging on the wall of my office is a plaque from the year 1996. It's a "Public Service Award" given to Union Congregational Church from Northeast Wisconsin Habitat for Humanity. It acknowledges an "Outstanding Demonstration of Commitment, Leadership, and the Gracious Donation of Funds and Employee Volunteer Services."

As I've documented here before, what is now Greater Green Bay Habitat for Humanity BEGAN at Union Congregational UCC in 1987. Habitat is part of the history of Union as a "start-up church." The legacy continues with On the Mark Dyslexia Clinic (founded 2018) and the Brain Center of Green Bay that just opened in the new incubator space in our lower level.

But Habitat continues to grow in Green Bay—as you no doubt have noticed if you've visited or driven past the new headquarters and ReStore building at 1967 Allouez Avenue (across the street from Target).

Did you know that you can volunteer to work at the ReStore in addition to working on a build site?

The new store is huge, and they need volunteers to help stock, and to staff the facility which is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays, and from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday.

Do you need a doorknob? You can find one, cheaply, at the ReStore. Do you need a door? Guess where you can find one—cheaply? How about a floor? A light fixture? I'm sure you're beginning to see the light (sorry).

And did I mention that products at the ReStore are CHEAP (while also being of good or excellent quality)? For instance, I furnished a 10 x 8 bathroom in our basement with all fixtures and a beautiful and durable ceramic tile for under \$100. If you like hunting for DIY bargains, this store is the place to go. They have tools, too!

And did you know that, since many of the commodities for sale are donated, the ReStore helps Green Bay get greener? Over six million pounds of materials that otherwise might have wound up in our local landfills

instead went back into service in apartments and homes in NE Wisconsin. If you're remodeling, guess where you can donate your old fixtures?

All proceeds from the ReStore get funneled back into Habitat building projects—so the more you spend, the more homes Habitat can build with families in need. As Habitat's founders Millard and Linda Fuller put it, that is to follow the "economics of Jesus"—when we give, God grows the gift.

So, if you haven't visited the new site on Allouez Avenue, I strongly encourage you to check it out.

There are other ways to help Habitat as well. I know many Union members like working at the build sites—and we'll be scheduling those for spring and summer very soon. Union members have also generously supported Habitat with financial contributions including over \$1,200 last summer/fall during our special drive. That legacy begun in 1996 is still alive and well.

And this year, Habitat will be part of the Give Big Green Bay event, scheduled for February 18 and 19. There are many worthy recipients of your dollars in this fundraising event, and I encourage you to support one (or several!) of your choosing.

You can designate specific funds to specific causes including Habitat for Humanity of Greater Green Bay. AND every dollar you donate is matched by the Green Bay Packers Foundation, doubling any contribution you make.

All of our work with Habitat for Humanity is coordinated through our Outreach Ministry, co-chaired by Christie Reese and Achim Seifert. Participating with Habitat for Humanity is a wonderful way to give back to this great city, and to continue the legacy of this "start-up church."

## Lenten Cluster Goes to the Movies

This year our Lenten Cluster will once again go to the movies! Gather with your fellow Unionites, Pastor Bridget, and Jon Pahl as we screen and discuss the faith implications of one film every Sunday night of Lent. With themes of redemption, justice, race, and pilgrimage, discussions promise to be lively.

We'll ask one or two participants to sign up to bring a big pot of soup every week, and Bridget will bring the popcorn. Plan on 5 p.m. until 7:30 or 8 p.m., depending on the length of the movie. We have listed their ratings to help you determine their age appropriateness.

There is a sign-up sheet at Union Central to participate and a separate one for those who would be willing to provide a large pot of soup, or you can contact the church office to indicate interest.

**March 1: The Mission** (1986) – Robert DeNiro and Jeremy Irons star in this film about 18th century Spanish missionaries trying to protect a remote South American tribe in danger of falling under the rule of pro-slavery Portugal. Themes of colonialism and conversion make this a particularly poignant movie for Lent. (PG – violence, mature subject matter)

**March 8: 13th** (2016) – Beginning with the passage of the 13th Amendment which abolished slavery, director Ava DuVernay explores the current U.S. prison system through the use of both historical footage and interviews. Themes of inequality and systemic injustice make this a powerful movie for Lent. (TV-MA)

**March 15: Selma** (2014) – The parenthetical title of this film is “One Dream Can Change the World.” David Oyelowo brings Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.’s revolutionary work to life in this epic film highlighting the historic march from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama in 1965 in which justice seekers worked to secure equal voting rights for African Americans and other people of color. (PG-13)

**March 22: Romero** (1989) – In 1970s El Salvador, the new bishop speaks out against the government amidst that country’s decade long civil war. Based on a true story, Raul Julia stars in this powerful film which will help us to engage questions of the role of the church in civil affairs and if/when violence is justified. (PG-13)

**March 29: Coco** (2017) – This animated film about the Mexican celebration of Dia de los Muertos features an aspiring young guitar player trying to find answers about his family. His quest leads him to the entrance of Tierra De Muertos, where all dead people live if they are remembered well. This film with themes of love, hate, death, music, betrayal, and most of all relationship, rounds out this year’s Lent movies. (PG)

## Ash Wednesday is February 26

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 26. We will worship in the sanctuary at 7 p.m. The service offers us the possibility to renew our dedication to the ways of Jesus. We will receive the ashes of repentance and the oil of healing. Join us!


## The Spirit Awaits All Open Hearts: Artistic Witness in the Church Library

Immigration Advocacy group members Lou Norsetter, Barbara McClure-Lukens, and Judy Larmouth gave a moving witness to the heart-breaking events occurring in the desert and in the courts at our southern border. I urge the congregation to look for upcoming opportunities to hear their stories.

Meanwhile we have resources of various kinds in the library addressing the fraught journeys and memories of immigrants and refugees to our country. They are listed below and available in the basket under the window.

### Two artistic witnesses to the other and the outcast

1. Brother Robert Lentz paints icons, some of which are collected in a book called Christ in the Margins with reflections by Edwina Gately. Gately writes in the first chapter: "But the work of the Spirit is not limited to founders only...The Holy Spirit is not selective or exclusive—she awaits all open hearts...We must not be afraid to be founders, enfleshers of new things." Responding to the icon here, Gately says, "The icon does not make clear which side of the fence Christ is on. Is he imprisoned or are we?"
2. The other witness that came to mind after the Immigrant Advocacy presentation was from a book called Hagar Poems by Mohja Kahf. The foreword invites us to read from the perspectives of Sarahs and Hagar, both ancient and modern.

## Stories from the Archives: Green Bay's Underground Railroad History

The UW-Green Bay Archives and Area Research Center is launching a new series: "Stories from the Archives." In conjunction with Black History Month, the first installment in is Green Bay's Underground Railroad History. This free program, open to the public, will take place Wednesday, February 19 from 4:30 to 6 p.m. in University Archives, located on the seventh floor of the Cofrin Library on the Green Bay campus. St. Norbert College professor Victoria Tashjian will share her research discoveries about Green Bay's First Presbyterian Church (today's Union Congregational United Church of Christ) which led to its designation as a site on the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom. ## Protest Jazz: Honoring Black History Month Sunday, February 23, 3 p.m. (note time/date change)

The history of jazz is rich with protest music, given that jazz has roots in the spirituals and blues. This service will include protest hymns such as "Wade in the Water" and "We are Marching (Siyahamba)," along with some of the most powerful works in the protest jazz corpus including John Coltrane, "Alabama"; Charles Mingus, "Fables of Faubus"; Charlie Parker, "Now's the Time"; and Nina Simone, "Backlash Blues." Readings will include reflections by the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.; bell hooks; Toni Morrison; and Cornel West. Join us for this celebration of music as protest: We Shall Overcome! Led by Rissel Peguero and the Union Jazz Collective.

## World Day of Prayer 2020

All are welcome to join in the ecumenical World Day of Prayer 2020. This year's observance in Green Bay will be held here at Union Church at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 4 in Bagby Chapel. The lead country this year is Zimbabwe.
