

Dear Union Friends,

The Immigrant Welcoming Advocacy Team is excited to be launching a survey next month to help better understand the congregation's interests and willingness to roll up its sleeves and get to work on issues, and they'll also be conducting one-on-one conversations to take the pulse of the congregation as well as to build relationships.

Along with coordinating our ReUnion Sunday potluck on September 10 and initiating a new round of Eight to Eat, Inreach Ministry is also rolling out two new ministries this fall. Watch for details of a new card writing ministry intended to help members connect with those we are praying for, and a new meal ministry intended to serve folks coming home from the hospital, grieving, welcoming new babies, etc.

Union Church Faith Formation 2017-18

Our Sunday School kicks off with an open house on September 10. Children, parents and teachers will get to know one another in the Cloud Room. This year we will have three classrooms: the K4-4th graders will start the morning together in the Cloud Room at the top of the stairs and then divide into two age-appropriate rooms, and the 5th graders on up will gather in the Youth Room downstairs. This allows us to gather more children together to learn and live the faith, while at the same time being able to be flexible to teach to their learning styles and ages.

Our curriculum for ages 4 through 4th grade will be "Shine" (https://shinecurriculum.com/), a dynamic Sunday school curriculum that engages Christian communities and families in their life together through Bible Stories, spiritual practices, peacemaking, service, and more. The 5th grade on up group will use Shine's "Gen Y" curriculum.

Sunday School Open House is Sunday, September 10 at 9:00 a.m. Youth Group Orientation is Wednesday, September 13 at 5:45 p.m.

Our Wednesday night programs will begin on September 13 with dinner at 5:45 p.m. followed by youth groups (Pilgrim Fellowship for 5th-8th grade and Young Christians in Action for 9th-12th). Youth will engage in "purposeful play," mission projects, learning, and relationship building.

We have a tremendous slate of teachers, leaders, aides, cooks, and bottle washers lined up this year, and we still need more. As with everything at church, our child and youth formation ministries don't work without the ongoing efforts of our members and friends. All parents of participating children and youth are requested to be a part of an open house – September 10 at 9 a.m. for Sunday School and September 13 at 5:45 p.m. for Youth Groups. At these, we will share what you can expect for the year and what is expected of participating families. It is very important that all parents find a niche to help with these programs. The programs simply cannot exist without you.

Moon Beach All-Church Retreat (Sept. 15, 16, 17)

What is the Moon Beach Retreat? Where is Moon Beach Camp and what do we do there?

Moon Beach Retreat is a weekend of fun, fellowship and reflection. It is a great place to share worship opportunities, discussion and camaraderie, with friends new and old.

Moon Beach Camp is in St. Germain just west of Eagle River and is part of the Outdoor Ministry program of the United Church of Christ. It sits on the shores of Moon Lake and Little Saint Germain Lake. The cabins overlook Moon Lake and have been redone so each is furnished, heated and has a bathroom with a shower. There is a large beautiful lodge, and the camp is fully staffed with wonderful, helpful people. The camp offers the peaceful quiet of northern Wisconsin among pine, oak and birch trees.

Friday, after arriving and getting settled, there will be snacks and fellowship time around the fireplace in the lodge. We are treated to three delicious meals on Saturday prepared by the camp and then a fabulous brunch Sunday morning. Saturday, after breakfast, adults are invited to meet with our leader/facilitator in the lodge (topic and leader to be determined). Children will have their own separate program. The afternoon and evening are up to you. There will be some activities and sometimes a short service project for benefit of the camp. There is a beautiful beach with a variety of watercraft, hiking trails and beautiful places to just sit, read and reflect. The evening is game time highlighted by ice cream sundaes and a bonfire.

Sunday morning is check out. We pack up, enjoy brunch, have an informal worship service by the fireplace, clean up the cabins, and are usually on our way home around 11 o'clock.

The cost for the retreat is \$140 per adult and \$25 per child. Financial aid is available (talk to Pastor Bridget). A registration form has been included with this newsletter.

Seminary Secrets Mini-course:

Biblical Scholarship 101

True or False? Regarding the origin of the Bible: God whispered words into the authors' hearts and the authors wrote them down (in English, of course), after which the Bible floated down from the sky, complete with paragraph headings and red print when Jesus speaks. If you answered False, you have taken the first step to understanding how our Bible came into being! In fact, the Bible is the product of many minds and took over 1,000 years to come into its present form. How did this whole process occur? Who decided which of the many religious writings of biblical times "made the cut" and got into our Bible? The ancient manuscripts for any given book have many discrepancies; how do translators decide which to choose when creating an English translation? And most importantly, why does any of this matter?!

<u>True or False?</u> The only tool needed to understand the Bible is the ability to read and think for oneself. Unfortunately, the answer is again False. Understanding what the original authors were getting at requires a number of tools, which biblical scholars have been using for at least a century. Would you like to learn about these and practice putting them to use? It's fun AND useful!

If these questions pique your curiosity, plan to attend this Seminary Secrets mini-series:

For Whom: Anyone who's interested, whether you know the Bible well or have never opened it. Seminary Secrets students: this is a chance to review!

Homework: Short readings will be provided prior to class.

God Smites the Egyptians: Foundational Text or Horrifying One?

The Passover story (Exodus 12.1-36) is so foundational to both Jewish and Christian tradition that it is referred to over and over again in later biblical texts-in both the Old and New Testaments. For example, when John's Gospel refers to Jesus as "The Lamb of God," it is the Passover Lamb that is being referenced. So one could argue that knowing this story is necessary to a full understanding of classic Christian tradition. On the other hand, a close reading of the story itself portrays God as a vindictive, self-aggrandizing, and indiscriminately violent tyrant. How are we, as 21st century, progressive, thinking Christians, to reconcile both these realities?

On September 10 at 9:00 a.m. in the Chapel Classroom (behind Bagby Chapel), Julie Harder (jblackharder@gmail.com) will guide us through a close reading of this text, looking at its literary, historical, and cultural context. Come join the discussion! Bibles will be provided, but you may wish to bring your own so you can underline, make notes in the margins, and so on.

Back Bay Mission Week (November 25—December 3)

Back Bay Mission is a UCC mission supporting the homeless and disadvantaged in Biloxi, Mississippi. Union Church sent volunteer workers there several years ago. Our work then was mostly rehabbing homes after Hurricane Katrina.

Now we have a core group prepared to work alongside others from UCC churches in De Pere and the Northwoods. The designated week is late November; we will travel beginning Sat., Nov. 25, and return home by Sunday, Dec. 3. Workdays are Mon., Tues., Thurs., and Fri. leaving Wednesday for potential sightseeing and other activities of choice.

Travel expenses are estimated at \$175 per person and there will be food expenses while at Back Bay. We will be staying in dorms on the campus.


