

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Sanctuary creates sanctuary!

This spring, more than a dozen churches and religious organizations in the Green Bay area came together to address an urgent need in our community: the need for emergency shelter. While there are a couple of organizations that provide year-round shelter, each of these have specific niches that they serve and have capacity limits. Additionally, six months out of the year, St. John the Evangelist Homeless Shelter was able to take in the overflow when the other shelters were at capacity or a person in need didn't fit in to the other shelters' criteria.

However, the city of Green Bay only allowed St. John's to be open six months out of the year, creating a vacuum of support for those people who slipped through the cracks of the other shelters, often the very most vulnerable among us. When a homeless man died while taking shelter in a Dumpster in May of 2017, outrage among faith leaders and advocates for people experiencing homelessness led to the development of St. John's COTS (Conditional Overnight Temporary Shelter). Basically, the St. John's organization would run the shelter in a different church every week, therefore circumventing the need for licensing. The city was on board with this. The police department was happy to support it, as St. John's is an invaluable resource for them when they encounter people in need of shelter.

And so it began. Union was one of the first churches to sign on. We hosted an average of 18 guests each night the second week of June. St. John's provided the staff and insurance, and we provided snacks and fans (that was the beginning of this summer's heat wave).

One night while Union was hosting COTS, the Green Bay Police encountered a 92-year-old man who was disoriented, wandering the streets. It turns out he had been evicted after being the victim of elder abuse — someone had cleaned out his bank accounts. The police were able to bring him here to Union, so that he could at least be off of the streets until the next morning when other social service organizations could get involved.

When the village of Allouez learned that this roving shelter had been housed for a week at a church within their limits, public meetings ensued, the media were called, and the village passed an ordinance limiting homeless shelters from operating for more that two weeks. The same media stories caught the attention of the Green Bay Fire Department. The fire department felt that the St. John's building would be a preferred location for the shelter year round, since it is already designed for overnight shelter services. The Green Bay Police department has also weighed in, saying that they are now thankful to have one place to consistently rely on when engaging with people experiencing homelessness.

While it may not sound like big news to have St. John's utilizing their building year round rather than only 6 months, it really is. Before the fire department's advocacy which led to the return to St. John's building, the COTS program provided over 1,000 nights of safe sleeping for our brothers and sisters in need.

In Matthew 25, Jesus tells us that whatever we do to the least among us, we do to him. Through COTS and St. John's, we are able to say that we are providing safe emergency housing to Christ among us. Thank you, and thank God.

Union Church Faith Formation 2018-19

Sunday School kicks off with an open house on September 9. Children, parents and teachers will get to know one another in the Cloud Room. This year we will have three classrooms: the K4-6th graders will start the morning together in the Cloud Room at the top of the stairs and then divide into two age-appropriate rooms, and the 7th graders on up will gather in the Youth Room downstairs. This allows us to gather more children together to learn and live the faith, while at the same time being able to be flexible to teach to their learning styles and ages.

Curriculum for ages 4 through 2nd grade will be "Shine," a dynamic Sunday school curriculum that engages Christian communities and families in their life together through Bible Stories, spiritual practices, peacemaking, service, and more. The 3rd-6th grade group will use a curriculum that teaches "The Bible in One Year" in fun and focused learning.



Our Wednesday night programs will begin on September 12 with dinner at 5:45 p.m. followed by youth groups (Pilgrim Fellowship for 4th-7th grade and Young Christians in Action for 8th-12th). Youth will engage in "purposeful play," mission projects, learning, and relationship building.

We have a tremendous slate of teachers, leaders, aides, cooks, and bottle washers lined up this year, and we still need more. As with everything at church, our child and youth formation ministries don't work without the ongoing efforts of our members and friends. All parents of participating children and youth are requested to be a part of an open house – September 9 at 9 a.m. for Sunday School and September 12 at 5:45 p.m. for Youth Groups. At these, we will share what you can expect for the year and what is expected of participating families. It is very important that all parents find a niche to help with these programs. The programs simply cannot exist without you.




Stick around after the workshop for a discussion on what will be happening next as we move toward launching a Proud Theater chapter in Green Bay.

Books for Children in the Church Library

Our picture book collection is a strength in our Church Library. We have several sections to help you find what you are looking for to help your children or grandchildren learn about God, Jesus, the Bible, and people similar to and different from themselves. The sections are color coded and labeled, but books mentioned here will be pulled out and placed in the display basket on the low table under the window.

In the green section (toddler books), two books about friendship describe the feelings and actions of friends, with few words and an emotionally thoughtful narrative: Friends by Mies Van Hout and A Splendid Friend, Indeed by Suzanne Bloom.

Wordless books span age groups. Look at the picture book <u>Little Bird</u> to imagine the story of a man meeting his match in a little bird or <u>Jonah and the Whale</u>. While technically not wordless like Peter Spier's <u>Noah and the Ark</u>, it has detailed pictures which carry the story even for the youngest. The end notes, a cross



section of the Phoenician ship and a map of its possible travels in the Mediterranean, are intriguing. An early memory of mine is watching my then three-year-old son poring over the ship cross section with a new found discovery of the power of books.

In the New Testament section, our newest "biography" of Jesus is <u>Miracle Man</u> by John Hendrix. Illustrated in a style reminiscent of graphic novels, preliterate and beginning readers will garner as much from the sweep of the illustrations as from the text. And the topic of miracles is endlessly fascinating to this group which is on the cusp of changing how they believe.

General picture books are marked with red labels. Take a look at <u>A Different Pond</u> by Bao Phi. This story is reminiscence of Phi's childhood as a member of a Vietnamese immigrant family. The illustrator, Thi Bui, shares this background, giving us an authentic and revealing father/son story about fishing. It is a Caldecott Honor Book for 2018.

As a follow-up to her visit in May, Darleen Denny recommends a couple of Oneida stories. One is the picture book <u>Thirteen Moons on A Turtle's Back</u> by Joseph Bruchac. The other is the Iroquois creation story in a picture book called <u>Skywoman</u> by Joanne Shenandoah. You can find both in the basket. For more about creation, look at Virginia Hamilton's In the Beginning: Creation Stories from Around the World, children's nonfiction number 291.2.

Seminary Secrets: When Scriptures Conflict

Wednesdays This Fall

Ever notice that various Bible passages sometimes seem to contradict each other? This reality can be confusing for those who look to the Bible as the foundation of the Christian tradition. This fall, Seminary Secrets classes will focus on some of these contradictory texts, and consider how to discern in which ones God is "still speaking."

What criteria can be brought to such an evaluation, you might ask? The first step is to understand the historical context and point of view of each author. Next, we will ask, "Is this text consistent with the way Jesus pointed to God's love for us and our calling to love one another?"

WHAT? In these sessions, we learn about the tools that biblical and theological scholars employ in their interpretations and arguments. We apply these new insights to our lives as Christians.

LEADER? Julie Harder. Julie holds a master's degree in theology/biblical studies and has taught religious studies at St. Norbert College.

All-Church Retreat September 14, 15 and 16

Our All-Church Retreat is a weekend of fun, fellowship and reflection. It is a great place to worship, discuss and enjoy camaraderie, with friends of all ages.

Moon Beach Camp is in St. Germain just west of Eagle River and is part of the Outdoor Ministry program of the United Church of Christ. It sits on the shores of Moon Lake and Little Saint Germain Lake. Cabins overlook Moon Lake and each is furnished, heated and has a bathroom with a shower. There is a beautiful lodge, and the camp is fully staffed with helpful people. The camp offers the peaceful quiet of northern Wisconsin amongst the native pine, oak and birch trees.

Friday evening, there will be snacks and fellowship time around the fireplace in the lodge. We are treated to three meals on Saturday and brunch on Sunday. Saturday, adults are invited for interactive learning with our leader/facilitator, Dr. Jon Pahl. Our theme "Exploring Sacred Space," is based on one of JP's books. The youth have their own program led by camp members.

The afternoon and evening are up to you. There will be activities, planned and impromptu. There is a beach with a variety of watercraft, hiking trails and places to sit, read and reflect. Evening is game time with ice cream sundaes and a bonfire.


