

Annual Conference, 2018 or, What I Learned on my Summer "Vacation"

Union Congregational, UCC was well represented at the Wisconsin Conference Annual Meeting of the United Church of Christ (think political convention, only a lot more singing and praying). The event was held Thursday-Sunday (June 7 to 10) at Green Lake Conference Center. Pastor Bridget and I represented the staff, Lou Ann Norsetter and Steve Jones were also delegates, and Rev. Jan Davis again served as meeting secretary. Lou Ann was also recognized for her excellent work in Lay Academy (which, if you have an interest in theology, church history, and church leadership, you ought to check it out!)

It was my first Wisconsin Conference gathering, and here are some of my takeaways:

- Rev. Traci Blackmon (Google her!) is a gift to the church. She preached at our worship on Friday, and she delivered a keynote lecture on Saturday. Her theme was "get in the boat"; that is, be the church! We do so when we work for justice, and her focus especially was on working for racial justice. The topic of the conference was "Why Are We Afraid? The Winds of Race and Privilege." I'd like to see us bring Rev. Blackmon here to Green Bay some Sunday. We'd need a special occasion, and we'd want to invite special guests.
- A resolution to study repudiating the doctrine of discovery passed unanimously, and we'll be taking up this theme in our Faith Formation next year. The resolution came from the Hocak United Church of Christ, the only Native American congregation in the Wisconsin Conference. I'm sure our new friends in the Oneida Nation will be supportive and helpful as we study this issue (FYI: the "doctrine of discovery" is the idea that North America was "discovered" by Europeans—as if the native inhabitants didn't exist).

- Through CHHSM (pronounced "Chism"), the Council for Health and Human Services Ministries, the
 UCC extends caring and compassion to people on the margins of society, and especially the aging,
 children, youth, and people with disabilities. I didn't know CHHSM existed! And yet, through the
 agencies of this Council of the church (through our work) more than one million people received
 compassionate services last year.
- The 3 Great Loves—for neighbor, children, and the Earth—is a story-telling initiative across the UCC. How have YOU lived out one of the three great loves? Why not tell that story! Go to: http://3greatloves.uccpages.org/
- There are some fine musicians in the Wisconsin Conference! I had the privilege of meeting (and playing with) Bryan Sirchio (Google him, too!) His soulful and theologically-deep music warmed our hearts and engaged our minds, and his guitar-playing and singing made us tap our toes. I've brought back lead sheets and bulletin inserts so that maybe we can do some of his music in the future during worship.
- Bryan Johnson, Executive Director of Sacred Music at Trinity UCC in Chicago, was also "in the house" on the piano and as choir director. It was a joy to sit in with him, as well. We sang a song he wrote, "We are the Church," along with a gospel classic, "Every Praise." I was delighted that I was able to solo on the alto sax along with him on "Let Us Break Bread Together." He, too, could be a great guest to bring to Union some weekend.

All in all, what I learned during the Conference, which was rich and exhausting (I *crashed* Sunday night), is that the Wisconsin Conference of the UCC is alive and well. "We Are the Church!" I hope you agree with me that it's a joy to be a part of this great cloud of witnesses.

All-Church Retreat September 14, 15 and 16

Our All-Church Retreat is a weekend of fun, fellowship and reflection. It is a great place to worship, discuss and enjoy camaraderie, with friends of all ages.

Moon Beach Camp is in St. Germain just west of Eagle River and is part of the Outdoor Ministry program of the United Church of Christ. It sits on the shores of Moon Lake and Little Saint Germain Lake. Cabins overlook Moon Lake and each is furnished, heated and has a bathroom with a shower. There is a beautiful lodge, and the camp is fully staffed with helpful people. The camp offers the peaceful quiet of northern Wisconsin amongst the native pine, oak and birch trees.

Friday evening, there will be snacks and fellowship time around the fireplace in the lodge. We are treated to three meals on Saturday and brunch on Sunday. Saturday, adults are invited for interactive learning with our leader/facilitator, Dr. Jon Pahl. Our theme "Exploring Sacred Space," is based on one of JP's books. The youth have their own program led by camp members.

The afternoon and evening are up to you. There will be activities, planned and impromptu. There is a beach with a variety of watercraft, hiking trails and places to sit, read and reflect. Evening is game time with ice cream sundaes and a bonfire.

Sunday we pack up, enjoy brunch, and worship informally. We are usually on our way by 11 o'clock.

Cost for the retreat is \$140 per adult and \$25 per child. Financial aid is available (talk to Pastor Bridget). Sign up sheets and registration forms are available at Union Central.


