Why I Hate Lent

I know, I know—"hate" is such a strong word, right? Lisa and I wouldn't let our kids say it in the house.

So why do I think it's all right to say that I hate Lent?

For much of the history of Christianity, our faith has been interpreted in terms of sacrifice. Many Christians have been persuaded that we MUST sacrifice to be Christian. And Lent is the preeminent liturgical season of sacrifice. And I hate it because it can reinforce a theology that has harmed lots and lots of people.

Now, I'm not talking here about giving up meat, or sweets, or booze for Lent. That kind of self-chosen renunciation can be a valuable spiritual discipline. Notice how I emphasized, though, that the renunciation must be self-chosen.

For too much of Christian history, people have been forced to sacrifice—even if it's not healthy for them to do so.

And if you want to know how this can produce real harm, take a look at the current scandal about sexual violence disrupting the Roman Catholic Church.

There are some people who are called to celibacy. Amen, if they have that gift. But as psychologist and former Roman Catholic priest Eugen Drewermann (who was silenced by the Vatican in the 1990s) puts it, such an imposed ideal is "psychologically cruel and mentally enslaving." It produces hypocrisy as the news media has been discovering and exposing over the past several decades.

But the problem is hardly limited to the Roman Catholic Church. A theology that associates being Christian with "sacrifice" is also a problem for many Protestants in the U.S. In a scathing and prophetic book, U.S. War Culture, Sacrifice, and Salvation, theologian Kelly Denton-Borhaug documents how war—systematic killing, has repeatedly been described

as "sacrifice" in U.S. popular culture. To justify the Vietnam War, for instance, General William Westmoreland said that we had to kill the Vietnamese in order to save them—and that led to the "sacrifice" of 58,000 U.S. lives, and roughly 1.5 million Vietnamese. And I thought we had a separation of church and state?

So, I hate Lent because it's the season that can lead Christians down this treacherous road—thinking that WE have to be the ones to "sacrifice" to save the world.

Thank God, then, that in our sermons here at Union, in our worship, and even in our upcoming Lenten film series, we'll remember that it was Jesus who died (at the hands of Empire) so that we can LIVE (and love, not hate!) As theologian S. Mark Heim puts it, in yet another book to add to your reading list—at its best, Lent can remind us (as we remember Jesus' passion) that we are Saved from Sacrifice.

So, give something up for Lent, if you want. But even better—come join us on Sunday, or for dinner church on Wednesday, or on work with a ministry team that fits your interests and passions. All in all, I'm eager for the 40 days of Lent to be something to love, not hate. And I can't make that shift without your help! So please come join us this Lent as we move out of winter and into Spring, and as we move through Jesus' passion and into the new life of Easter's resurrection.

Lent begins Wednesday, March 6. We'll have brief dinner church at 5:45 p.m. in Pilgrim Hall, with the service with ashes beginning at 7 p.m. in the sanctuary. And let those ashes remind you, when you see them, that Jesus died so that we can live—and live abundantly.

Seminary Secrets Miniseries

In this Seminary Secrets miniseries, we'll discuss the book <u>Praying for Jennifer</u>. This short novel (90 pages) centers around four teens who are in a car crash. Three are fine but one, Jennifer, is left in a coma. Her friends want to pray for her, but aren't sure how or whether it will do any good. Each chapter introduces a new character who brings his or her perspective on prayer and on the nature of God to these young people, who question and challenge at each step of the way. The author, John B. Cobb Jr., is a process theologian; the concept of God that process theology entails is introduced near the end of the story.

Lenten Cluster 2019 Goes to the Movies

This year our Lenten Cluster will once again go to the movies! Gather with your fellow Unionites, Pastor Bridget, and Dr. Jon Pahl as we screen and discuss the faith implications of one film every Sunday night of Lent.

We'll ask one or two participants to sign up to bring a big pot of soup every week, and Bridget will bring the popcorn. Plan on 5 p.m. until 7:30 or 8 p.m., depending on the length of the movie. This year, our theme is Christ figures in film. We have included what ratings each film was assigned by the Motion Picture Association of America.

There is a sign-up sheet at Union Central to participate and a separate one for those who would be willing to provide a pot of soup, or you can contact the church office to indicate interest.

The Lineup of Films

March 10 – "Jesus of Montreal" (R)

The film tells the story of a group of actors in Montreal who perform a Passion play in a Quebec church, combining religious belief with unconventional theories on a historical Jesus. As the church turns against the main actor and author of the play, his life increasingly mirrors the story of Jesus, and the film adapts numerous stories from the New Testament.

March 17 & 24 – "The Last Temptation of Christ" (R)

Willem Dafoe stars in Martin Scorsese's controversial film in which Jesus of Nazareth, tormented by the temptations of demons, the guilt of making crosses for the Romans, pity for people and the world, and the constant call of God, sets out to find what God wills for Him. But as His mission nears fulfillment, He must face the greatest temptation; the normal life of a good man. Based, not on the Gospels, but on Nikos Kazantzakis' novel of the same name.

March 31 – "Norma Rae" (PG)

Themes of calling, sacrifice, and something bigger than oneself bring to life Sally Fields' Oscar winning performance about a worker who struggles to unionize the textile mill where she and her entire town works.

April 7 – "The Life of Brian" (R)

Born on the first Christmas in the stable next door to Jesus, Brian of Nazareth spends his life being mistaken for the messiah. While poking holes in bad theology, Monty Python's blasphemous, sacrilegious, contentious film also helps to bring into focus Jesus' mission and purpose.

Union Library: Responding to Anti-Semitism in Children's Literature

As a Protestant church library, it may be strange to some that we collect books about Judaism in both the adult and children's collections. Relationships between practitioners of both religions have been fraught in history even while we have much in common. Three intermediate picture books skillfully depict the ways – both complex and simple – people have responded to anti-Semitism.

An incident that took place a few decades ago in Billings, Montana is narrated in the intermediate picture book, *The Christmas Menorahs*. That townspeople fought back against an act of hate with acts of community solidarity that always bring tears to my eyes. When a picture window displaying a menorah is shattered by rock, pictures of menorahs are taped to every picture window in the neighborhood by Jews and Christians alike.

Based on the acts of the French resistance during World War II, *The Secret Seder* illustrates how Jews in hiding refused to yield to the terror unleashed by Hitler's forces. Author Doreen Rappaport has written several picture books about bravery in the face of oppression. She captures a child's fear and uncertainty in perilous times and the power of the Sabbath to bring hope.

Golem by David Wisniewski is a dramatic folk tale set in Prague in the 1600s. Jews, facing harsh treatment by Christians, make a huge human-like creature from mud and set the golem against their enemies. Initially the display of power is gratifying and later mortifying. A lesson about the potential of power to corrupt even those with a righteous cause. The book won a Caldecott Honor.

For adults who would like to dig deeper into the history of anti-Semitism, Father Edward Flannery's *The Anguish of the Jews* has been added to the adult collection.

All books will be in the basket under the window in the church library for the month of March. Stop in to peruse these and other offerings. In *The Sabbath*, Jewish theologian Abraham Joshua Heschel highly recommends spiritual reading as part of the day of rest.

Gets Underway

The Brain Center of Green Bay, a startup led by Union member Rolf Lulloff, is off and running! The Board met on Thursday, February 28 in the English Room, and took a number of key steps in this new venture.

The Board includes Rolf (President), Dr. Jon Pahl (Secretary); David Donarski, MD; Richard Horak, MD; Daniel Koster, MD; Vincent Schamber, CPA; Kramer Rock; Deborah Mauthe; and Meg Kress Grunwald.

The vision of the Brain Center of Green Bay is that "every person will enjoy optimal brain health throughout their lifetime."

The mission of the Brain Center of Green Bay is to be a nonprofit organization that works to maximize brain health throughout life by increasing individual and society awareness and action utilizing Collaboration, Advocacy, Research, and Education (CARE).

The Board approved some bylaws changes, approved a conflict of interest statement, and discussed development efforts aimed at securing an annual budget of approximately \$200,000.

Housing offices for organizations like the Brain Center is one example of community engagement ministry, by which Union can leverage one of our greatest assets—our building—to align ourselves with mission compatible non-profits. Such community engagement supports mission partners, gets Union's name out in the community as a relevant, engaged institution, and at the same time helps us as we live in to the fiscal models which are 21st century church.

This is a lively and important new venture with considerable significance for the city of Green Bay and for all who struggle with the debilitating effects of brain disease. It's a wonderful ministry of healing and hope here at the heart of Union Church, and very much in keeping with our history as a "start-up Church."


