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Comfort, Comfort, Ye My People: Guns, Grief, and God

On the Sunday after the mass shootings in El Paso and Dayton, it was hard not to be shell-shocked. For many of us, the El Paso slaughter established a trend that raised the specter of the actions of brown shirts in Germany prior to the rise of Nazism. Such a targeted, racial mass-killing, stoked by rhetoric and policies from the highest offices in the nation, was frightening.

And that's why, for the next few weeks, the Worship Ministry has decided to create space during the "Prayers of the People" for the congregation to express our collective fears and grief and to raise them to the Lord Almighty. And then, at the conclusion of worship, we will sing together "Let There Be Peace on Earth." We will also reconvene our "Sacred Conversation on Gun Violence," in an effort to put flesh on our prayers.

We do this because to get stuck in grief and fear is to give in to the terrorists. Our God calls us to hope—no matter what. And that means that we carry on with the urgent, everyday matters of loving God and neighbor, growing a healthy and hopeful community, and worshiping together in music, prayer, preaching, and at the Communion table in ways that strengthen us for whatever struggles are ahead.

Isaiah 40:1 is the key verse, here: "Comfort, comfort my people, says our God." That is, the good news in Jesus Christ is that we can truly be free from any fear. God has endured the worst, and promises us abundant, even eternal, life: "O death, where is your victory? O grave, where is your sting?" (I Corinthians 15:55)

Christ's victory over death has empowered many saints to extraordinary acts of courage in the history of Christianity. Christ's victory over death can also empower us to act courageously in the face of the crisis of white nationalism that is the current scourge in our land.

And that means not only comforting troubled minds terrified by trauma, it also means confronting the root causes of the violence.

Sadly, many Americans have not yet reckoned with the deep historical trauma associated with race in America. Slavery and racism have rightly been called America's "original sin." White supremacy and "Christian" nationalism have been with us since America's founding. There is no room for innocence on these matters.

There *is* room for progress--for real healing and reparations for the injustices that existed in America's history. Until those historical traumas are recognized and healed, the present manifestations of racist hatred and violence will continue.

Furthermore, while it is about racism and white supremacy and nationalism, it is also about guns. The evidence is overwhelming: no other advanced country has to deal with these traumas of mass violence on such a regular basis, because no other country makes weapons of mass destruction so readily available to civilians.

As Christians, then, we are called to denounce white supremacy as a rejection of the freedom of Jesus Christ where there is no Jew or Gentile, black or white, Latinx or European. We are all ONE in Christ.

And as Christians, we are called to denounce the perversion of the gospel that is "Christian" nationalism, where the Prince of Peace is turned into a violent and militarized "patriot," and the God of love is twisted into a demon of hatred.

Here at Union Congregational United Church of Christ, it will be up to us to determine how best to act. But we must act. Our collective action, beyond "thoughts and prayers," will be the best way to display the courage that comes from faith in the God who is Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer of all life.

Union Church Faith Formation 2019-20

Faith Formation kicks off with an open house on September 8. Children, parents and teachers will get to know one another in the Chapel Classroom. This year we will have three classrooms: initially, Mayflower 1 and Mayflower 2 and the Choir Room.

Curriculum for ages 4 through 2nd grade will be "Shine," a dynamic Sunday school curriculum that engages Christian communities and families in their life together through Bible Stories, spiritual practices, peacemaking, service, and more. The 3rd-6th grade group will use a curriculum that teaches the Life of Jesus in fun and focused learning.

Faith Formation Open House is Sunday, September 8 at 9:00 a.m. Youth Group Orientation is Wednesday, September 11 at 5:45 p.m.

Our Wednesday night programs begin on September 11 with dinner at 5:45 p.m. followed by youth groups—Pilgrim Fellowship (grades 4-7) and Young Christians in Action (grades 8-12). Youth will engage in "purposeful play," mission projects, learning, and relationship building.

We have a tremendous slate of teachers, leaders, aides, cooks, and bottle washers lined, but we need more. As with everything at church, our child/youth formation ministries don't work without the ongoing efforts of our members and

friends. All parents of participating children and youth are asked to attend an open house – September 8 at 9 a.m. for Sunday School and September 11 at 5:45 p.m. for Youth Groups. At these, we will share what you can expect for the year and what is expected of participating families. It is very important that all parents find a niche to help with these programs. The programs simply cannot exist without you.

Church Library Fiction is a Doorway

About a year ago, a small group of readers—Jean Smithback, Julie Tetzlaff, Christie Reese, Judy Larmouth, Laurie Beauchamp and Cathy Putman—began to meet regularly to evaluate the fiction section of the church library. Some books got booted, most got read and reviewed, and we talked about what makes a good church library fiction collection.

Number 1. The book needs to be a good read! Since many page turners are also best sellers or genre fiction, we had to understand whether the lighter side of fiction had a role to play in the library collection. So, a second characteristic of a good book for us was that the story and characters stick with you.

Number 2. The book is memorable. For us, the beach read didn't make the cut, but genre fiction—mysteries, fantasy, science fiction—did resonate. We now have space for two genre fiction shelves, one for mysteries and one for science fiction and fantasy.

The mystery shelf will give us some space for popular series such as Maisie Dobbs (Winspear) and Inspector Gamache (Penny). If you have a recently published favorite you'd like to recommend or donate, please do so!

The science fiction/fantasy category has younger fans as well as adult, so a few of our young adult chapter books—Harry Potter, Philip Pullman and J. R. R. Tolkein—will move to that shelf. We have some newer acquisitions which you should take a look at, but welcome recommendations that are absorbing and memorable. This category lends itself particularly to our understanding of how technology and climate may figure in our future.

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Some of the Fictionista discussion revolved around the role of fiction

by authors who reside in cultures or subcultures different than ours. We had added a few multicultural novels including "The Beautiful Things that Heaven Bears" by Ethiopian immigrant Dinaw Mengestu and "Homegoing" by African American writer Yaa Gyasi.

Contemporary thinking about multicultural reading is that fiction can be a window into a new world, a mirror for those who are not members of the dominant culture, and a map moving between cultures. And of course, this reading is about empathy. At root that is the main role of fiction for us as Christians: to grow our empathy and generous spirit towards others.

The Fictionistas recommend the following good reads.

"Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine" (Honeyman) [Wacky and charming.]
"Mudbound" (Jordan) [Love and rage cohabit.]
"The History of Love" (Krauss) [Life affirming.]
"The Beautiful Mystery" (Penny) [Engrossing.]
"Wingshooters" (Revoyr) [Poignant study of racism and empathy.]
"Sarah's Key" (Rosnay) [World War 2 secrets in France.]
"A Thread of Grace" (Russell) [World War 2 in Italy.]
"Martyr's Crossing" (Wilentz) [Illuminating novel of the Middle East.]

One last note. "The First Winter," the Somali United ReSisters painful and amazing stories of their lives in Green Bay is now in the church library.

Book Worm Yoga! September Wednesday Adult Education Class

We're delighted to announce that on Wednesday evenings beginning September 11, and running for four weeks (through October 2), our neighbor (and sometime attender) Donna Leicht will be offering a course for all adult learners on a book by Deborah Adele, "The Yamas and Niyamas: Exploring Yoga's Ethical Practice."

Donna is a professional librarian who has developed an interest in yoga, and is trained as an instructor. A long-time UCC member (recently at Ebenezer UCC, Chilton), Donna has also come to appreciate the links between yoga and ethics.

Deborah Adele's book, which participants should purchase, explores the 10 central ethical practices at the heart of yoga, such as: Ahimsa (nonviolence), satya (truthfulness), brahmacharya (non-excess), and tapas (self-discipline), along with six others. To that end, Union has reconvened its "Sacred Conversation on Gun Violence." The first took place on Tuesday, August 13 in Pilgrim Hall. All are welcome to attend these gatherings.

For those of you who are not familiar with the Sacred Conversation on Gun Violence, this was a group of Union folks who gathered once or twice a month from 2015-2017 to learn about gun violence and pray about how to address it. It was modeled on the UCC's Sacred Conversations on Race from 2008, in which participants agree to be deeply respectful of one another's perspectives while seeking a new and Godly path.

Union's Immigration Advocacy Team is Moving Forward

- Following up on the contacts made at Union's Advocacy Day Teach-in, the Immigration Team is developing stronger relationships with local groups. This fall, Union will support a Community Friendship meal sponsored by Casa Alba Melanie. (https://www.casaalba.org/about-us.html)
- Migration Advocacy of Brown County encourages immigration advocates to take this action: Write or call your U.S. Representative and U.S. Senator (contacts below) in a monthly "Monday Call to Action" — (any Monday of the month; you may wish to program a reminder into your phone/calendar).

Ask them:

- 1. to visit the Concentration Camps and let you know what the conditions are like there.
- 2. for an update on how the \$4.6 billion for the Concentration Camps is being spent.
- 3. what their office is doing to reunite these families?
- The Immigration Team is exploring a possible mission trip to Arizona this winter, partnering with a UCC church that is doing grassroots work on the border.
- Heather Collins and Ed Tucker are now volunteering as a citizenship class teacher.
- As an action following the UCC General Synod meeting in Milwaukee, Immigration Team member and UCC General Synod attendee Lou Norsetter participated in a protest at the Milwaukee Office of Immigration Control and Enforcement (ICE). Following the march of several hundred protesters, UCC leaders spoke to the crowd. Police cordoned off the streets from local traffic at the office.
- In support of our Muslim neighbors and to learn about Islam, eight members of Union Church attended the "Fox Valley Islamic Society Interfaith Tent Gathering: Moving From Fear toward Mutual Trust" on August 4. Speakers included Dr. Jon Pahl, along with Rev. Dr. Thomas Willadsen (a Presbyterian Pastor) and Dr. Younis Zaidan of the Islamic Center of Wisconsin.



Back From the Border: A Psychologist's Observations 5:30 p.m., Monday, August 26 in Pilgrim Hall

Dr. Leslie Davis, a Psychologist at the Aurora Walker's Point Community Clinic in Milwaukee, has been invited to Green Bay by Casa Alba to share her experiences, observations and insights after a recent trip to the U.S./Mexico border. Dr. Davis brings both direct personal experience as well as the additional professional insights into some of the concerns that many people have. Since there are so many rumored accounts—often depending on the political bias of the persons speaking—the Union Immigration Advocacy team is co-sponsoring this event, as we believe it will be good to hear directly from someone who actually spends time at the border.

The goal is to invite as many caring people as possible to come hear actual observations of a professional. Now, more than ever because of the massacre in El Paso, we need to be better informed and motivated to act.

All-Church Retreat September 13, 14 and 15

Our All-Church Retreat is a weekend of fun, fellowship and reflection. It is a great place to worship, discuss and enjoy camaraderie, with friends of all ages.

Moon Beach Camp is in St. Germain just west of Eagle River and is part of the Outdoor Ministry program of the United Church of Christ. It sits on the shores of Moon Lake and Little Saint Germain Lake. Cabins overlook Moon Lake and each is furnished, heated and has a bathroom with a shower. There is a beautiful lodge, and the camp is fully staffed with helpful people. The camp offers the peaceful quiet of northern Wisconsin amongst the native pine, oak and birch trees.

Friday evening, there will be snacks and fellowship time around the lodge fireplace. We are treated to three meals on Saturday and brunch on Sunday. Saturday, adults are invited for interactive learning with our facilitator, the Rev. Jim Hicks, who will address our theme "Finding Joy Together in Chaotic Times."

The afternoon and evening are up to you. There will be activities, planned and impromptu. There is a beach with a variety of watercraft, hiking trails and places to sit, read and reflect. Evening is game time with ice cream sundaes and a bonfire.

Sunday we pack up, enjoy brunch, and worship informally. We are usually on our way by 11 o'clock.

Cost for the retreat is \$140 per adult and \$25 per child. Financial aid is available (talk to Pastor Bridget). Sign up sheets and registration forms are available at Union Central.

Visitation Ministry

Beginning in October, we will pilot a peer visitation program at Union. The program will pair volunteers with someone in the congregation who needs a "sympathetic ear." The member may be physically unable to come to church or may be experiencing some form of transition or loss, perhaps unemployment, death, divorce, or downsizing.

Regardless of the member's personal situation, they could use another's "presence." Our visitor's presence also means the church's presence. The primary skill of a good visitor? Listening!

Typically, our pastors will recognize a need for connection in a church member, ask if they would be interested in having a visitor, and then will assign one of our trained visitors to make the connection. Visitations will commonly begin with chats about the member: "Tell me about yourself, your family, perhaps how you've been involved in church." In time (several visits), the relationship may, hopefully, grow deeper.

Church visitors are not social workers. We do not provide transportation, run errands, clean houses or bestow gifts. We may suggest available services if the member does not already know of or use them.

This ministry starts from the basic theological premise that we believe that we are never alone; God is always near. The visitation ministry puts flesh on that belief. To that end, visitors will offer to pray with the member. In time, Worship Ministry is working on a process by which some visitors may offer Communion as part of their visit.

Generally, we anticipate monthly visits unless the member requests otherwise, and there will be ongoing, monthly training and support gatherings as well.

This ministry will start with a training on Thursday, October 3 at 6 p.m. in the Chapel Classroom. If you would like to be considered for this ministry or even to just ask a question, call Pastor Bridget (437-9266) or Lou Norsetter (217-1911).


