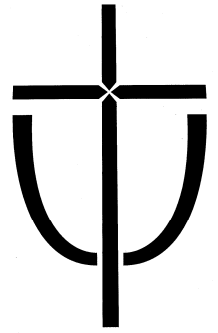

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The mantra in the grey box to the right has caught my imagination for months now. I came across it while trying to develop a new banner to hang outside of our Mayflower entrance. We've had our wonderful "No matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you're welcome here," banner hanging there for close to 10 years, much longer than anyone imagined it would last.

**Love over hate
Love over indifference
Love over ignorance
Love over ego
Love over fear
Love over barriers
Love over borders
Love over
And over
And over
Again.**

Over the years, I've had many conversations with people about that banner. When we hand out candy to trick-or-treaters on Halloween, we get a lot of positive feedback. Every year or two, someone in a New Member class will mention that the banner either drew them in, or reassured them that this is the right church for them.

That theme of extravagant welcome is central to who we understand ourselves to be as the United Church of Christ: a community dedicated to Jesus' work of welcoming the stranger, welcoming people with questions and doubts, welcoming people who may look different or sound different or love differently.

So finding a new slogan or phrase was going to be tough. When you've literally been flying an "all are welcome" flag, what comes next? We could simply replicate it, swap out the 10-year-old banner with a new one with fresh colors. But the reality is that even something as radical as extravagant welcome gets stale after 10 years. We needed something new, but it needed to be golden.

Then, as I was scrolling through recipes on Pinterest one evening, the poem above popped into my feed, and I was mesmerized. When I saved it and went back a week later, it seemed just as compelling. When I shared it with Common Ministry, they too found that it is just so...Union.

Much like the slogan on the banner we'll be retiring, this "Love Over All" theme captures the essence of who Union is and what we believe and do. Union is a church that prioritizes love over doctrine, love over policies, even love over beliefs.

The Balances of Nature in the Church Library

Biologist Rachel Carson wrote in 1962 in Silent Spring:

In some quarters nowadays it is fashionable to dismiss the balance of nature as a state of affairs that prevailed in an earlier, simpler world --- a state that has now been so thoroughly upset that we might as well forget it. Some find this a convenient assumption, but as a chart for a course of action it is highly dangerous. The balance of nature is not the same today as in Pleistocene times, but it is still there: a complex, precise, and highly integrated system of relationships between living things which cannot safely be ignored...

Land ethicist and scientist Wes Jackson commented in 1980 in Nature as Measure on the role of our creation story in establishing a hierarchy rather than a balance in nature:

In the last twenty years, molecular biologists have discovered that the basic structures of all life forms are made of the same twenty amino acids, and...the genetic code which orders the assembly of these molecular building blocks has one world-wide alphabet. This is really important, for the Judaeo-Christian myth in Genesis described a bimodal creation: God created everything except humans, paused a while, and then went on to create us. That pause has been important in the consciousness of Western society and in Islam. It has contributed to the belief that we are fundamentally different from other forms of life.

In a contrasting view, J. Philip Newell in 1999 reflects in his introduction to Celtic spirituality, The Book of Creation, on God's commandment to Moses to remove his shoes for he stood on holy ground:

We need to find new ways of reopening the doors of our senses to creation...The experience of feeling the earth with our feet is a symbol of rediscovery that needs to happen if we are to come back into a true sense of relationship with creation...It is the experience of the goodness of the earth that will help sustain our commitment to care for the earth.

In Sacred Instructions (2018), Sherri Mitchell, calls on us to embrace the balances of nature as both a spiritual and political covenant:

My tribal stories have taught me that our inherent rights as Penawahpskwe are derived for our first treaty or agreement: the agreement we made with the Creator when we first emerged into this world. The agreement was forged under the balanced laws of creation, and it provides us with the foundational authority for all the rights we stand on today...we have the right to live unencumbered on this land, with full access to the sources of our survival ... as long as we uphold our responsibility to live in balanced harmony with the rest of creation. [These rights] are strengthened or weakened by the degree of responsibility that we take to uphold our agreement.

Our modern sense of nature was birthed in the conservation movement of the late 19th and early 20th centuries with the writings of John Muir, Theodore Roosevelt and Aldo Leopold. The scientific jeremiad of Rachel Carson jolted modern consciousness out of an unthinking compliance with industry. Creation spirituality in many religions points us to the political and social justice implications of the climate imbalances of today. The books mentioned here are just a few of the church library's resources to explore in the upcoming year of the Green Gospel. Find them in the basket under the window.

Seminary Secrets Resumes October 9: What the heck do we do with Paul?

What one person shaped Christianity most profoundly? Most would answer, "Jesus, of course." But a case can be made that the Apostle Paul was as influential. In his letters, we find terms and concepts that Jesus apparently never uttered, but which became woven into Christian theology, ethics, and jargon. This influence is particularly astonishing given that Paul was not a follower of Jesus during Jesus' earthly ministry; in fact, most scholars have concluded that Paul never even met or listened to Jesus. (Somewhat weirdly, he never mentions Jesus' basic teachings.) Perhaps this influence was partly due to the fact that Paul wrote his letters long before the gospels were penned; in effect, he got his ideas out there first!

Understanding Paul's thought is further complicated by the fact that of the 13 letters in the New Testament that claim his authorship, only seven were indisputably written by him. So some of what is commonly attributed to Paul (women should submit to their husbands) was actually written by later authors who often were trying to "correct" Pauline ideas with which they disagreed! (In fact, women had positions of leadership and respect in Paul's churches.)

We spend a lot of time studying the gospels, both in worship and in Faith Formation, but I have found studying Paul to be indispensable in understanding both how Christian theology got where it did and where we as Jesus' followers are called to take it. Over time, I've concluded that Paul's letters contain both profoundly helpful insights and claims that either have little to do with Jesus' teachings or are anachronistic. How to tell the difference is key!

In the upcoming Seminary Secrets series, we will:

- Review the tools biblical scholars use to study Paul's letters, including determining which were penned by him vs. anonymous successors.
- Study passages that encapsulate Paul's key theologies, especially ones that have influenced Christian teachings.
- Discuss criteria we should use to evaluate each of these theologies.

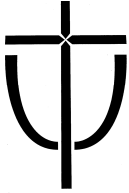
