Starting Sunday, October 25 (at 9 a.m.), we'll gather online to read together and discuss Pastor Lenny Duncan's book, "Dear Church: A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the U.S." While addressed to ELCA Lutherans, Duncan's call for Repentance, Reparations, and Reconciliation will resonate with and challenge all Christians, including our beloved community at Union. Lenny is a former student of Jon Pahl's. He has been on the front lines in Portland for the past several months. He serves as Mission Developer Pastor at Messiah Lutheran Church in Vancouver, Washington, where he lives. As Duncan asserts: "The church is gueer."

Lenny will meet with us via ZOOM on November 13, and will be our guest preacher on November 15. Join us for this study, and a conversation that promises to leave us changed for the better.





Anti-Racism Adult Education Sundays at 9 a.m.

Every Sunday at 9 a.m. (through November 22) we'll be gathering online (the link is in This Week at Union) for our ongoing studies in how to be antiracist. We began this past summer with a study of James Baldwin's classic book, "The Fire Next Time," and through most of October we're working our way through the UCC's own curriculum on white privilege, written by scholars and pastors like the Rev. John Dorhauer (General Minister and President of the UCC), Rev. Da Vita D. McCallister (Lead Pastor of First Church Sommerville UCC—featured in the photo), Rev. Traci Blackmon (Associate General Minister of Justice & Local Church Ministries), and Dr. Stephen G. Ray, Jr. (President, Chicago Theological Seminary). Join us!

Interfaith "Rivers of Faith" Events at UW-Green Bay

GIFT (Gathered in Faith Together, Green Bay's pre-eminent interreligious organization) has teamed up with the Mauthe Ecumenical Center at UW-Green Bay for a series of events this fall on the topic of "Rivers of Faith."

The metaphor comes from Diana Eck, founder and director of the Pluralism Project at Harvard, which advocates for and documents the growing religious pluralism of the United States. Her contention is that faith traditions, often understood in institutional terms, like boxes, are more organic, like rivers whose waters flow and merge.

Our own Jon Pahl was a speaker at the first event on September 17, where he shared a story from his book "Shopping Malls and Other Sacred Spaces." It was the story of his experience in a flash flood, as a metaphor for the changes he experienced in going to college and discovering critical thinking about religions.

The next two events are scheduled for October 15 ("When Many Rivers Become One") and November 19 (Interfaith Service) via ZOOM. Both events begin at 6 p.m. Rissel Peguero (and perhaps her sisters—Pegasis) will share some of their faith story on the 15th, along with representatives from two different faith traditions. 

New Books in the Church Library

The church library has 93 books about racism and Blackness, including some of the currently popular anti-racism works.

This summer I read a few biographies of Civil Rights leaders as an anti-racism project. They included James Farmer, one of the founders of CORE; Bayard Rustin, one of the foremost strategists of the movement; and John Lewis, SNCC leader and longtime Congressman from



Georgia. You'll find some of these and others in the church library.

From that reading much continues to haunt me. The first step in nonviolent direct action is seeking resolution through face-to-face meetings and communication. Peaceful protest was routinely met by violent backlash. Washington had little time and little trust for Civil Rights leaders until the protests became national news in Birmingham. And Rustin's observation that law and order do not exist in a vacuum, they exist to the degree that you have justice.

We continue to collect books about Native American history and experience including three recent titles for adults and one for children.

Native: Identity, Belonging, and Rediscovering God, by Kaitlin B. Curtice <u>Unsettling Truths: The Ongoing, Dehumanizing Legacy of the</u> <u>Doctrine of Discovery</u>, by Mark Charles <u>The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee: Native America from 1890 to</u> <u>the Present</u>, by David Treuer <u>We Are Water Protectors</u>, by Carole Lindstrom

I don't want to give the impression that the library is just about the body politic. The scholarly Anchor Bible interpretation series is now shelved in the Chapel Classroom to make room for additional works on the origins, nature and meanings of the Bible. For a deep dive, take a look at Karen Armstrong's <u>The Lost Art of Scripture</u>.

"Voices for Justice"

Keynote speaker: Rev. Traci Blackmon

"Until the lion tells the story, the hunter will always be the hero." —West African Proverb

Rev. Blackmon is Associate General Minister of Justice and Local Church Ministries for the United Church of Christ and Senior Pastor of Christ The King United Church of Christ, three miles from Ferguson, Missouri. She was a registered nurse for 25 years prior to becoming an ordained minister.

As a featured voice on many regional, national, and international platforms, Rev. Blackmon's life work focuses on communal resistance to systemic injustice. Her response in Ferguson to the killing of Michael Brown resulted in national and international recognition, gaining her audiences at the White House, the Carter Center, and the Vatican. She co-authored the White Privilege curriculum for the UCC and toured the nation with Rev. Dr. William Barber of Repairers of the Breach and Sister Simone Campbell of Nuns on the Bus, proclaiming the need for a Moral Revival in the nations.


