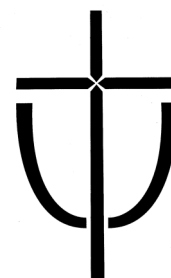

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

As the hymn goes, "How can I keep from singing?" For over a year, I've been promising that you'll be able to hear me shouting from the rooftops when it is finally healthy for us to resume worshipping in our sanctuary, and so I am pleased to report that Union's Common Ministry unanimously approved the recommendation of the Resuming In-Person Worship Task Force to open our building to worshippers starting with our service on June 13. All services will continue to be available online as well.

May 30 will be our last prerecorded service produced by Shaun Shoulden. June 6 will be a "test run" from the sanctuary of a livestreamed service, but will not have worshippers in the pews. You'll be able to access the services both of these weeks in the same way you've been worshipping throughout this year.

Then, on June 13, we will open the sanctuary doors to welcome worshippers once more.

Again, ALLELUIA!!! It has been such a grace-filled experience to have the technology and commitment to mutual health that has allowed us to worship online since March of last year, AND it will be magnificent to be with one another "in real life" as they say.

Here are the basics of how we will return to the sanctuary:

In light of the most recent CDC COVID-19 guidance, the Resuming In-Person Worship Task Force recommends that Union Church resume in-person worship on June 13 along with basic guidelines that are meant to protect the most vulnerable among us as we worship together. The task force will continue to make recommendations that will lead us to more robust worship practices as the COVID guidance evolves from the CDC and the Wisconsin Department of Health for Brown County.

Guidelines:

- As of June 13, we will resume in-person worship, without limiting capacity or requiring reservations, while maintaining social distancing.
- Services will continue to be live streamed. For your health, vulnerable and unvaccinated individuals are encouraged to follow CDC and state recommendations to avoid large gatherings and to worship with us from home.
- As a community which holds central the tenet of care for the vulnerable, people over 2 years of age will be expected to continue to wear masks at all times while in the building. Masks must cover both your mouth and nose, and your fellow worshippers will be encouraged to remind those whose masks slip. By requiring masks for all at this time, even those who are fully vaccinated, we circumvent the question of whether or not someone is vaccinated and do not “other” those who are not vaccinated.
- Social distancing will be required as households seat themselves in the sanctuary. We will rope off pews to make social distancing easier to maintain.
- Ushers/greeters will welcome members of the congregation, hand out bulletins, answer questions, etc.
- A cantor and instrumentalists will lead us in our musical worship; the congregation will not be invited to sing at this time. This is one of activities in worship that we will continue to monitor, and will revise this policy as soon as it is healthy to do so.
- The congregation will be invited to proclaim our prayers and our litany responses aloud while wearing their masks.
- Pre-packaged Communion elements will be available at the doors leading into the sanctuary on Communion Sundays. Alternately, you are welcome to bring your own elements of choice, just as you have done while we have been worshipping virtually. If they so choose, those worshipping online may obtain pre-packaged Communion elements at the church office, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.
- Watch your This Week at Union emails for information on how you can help us host a couple of coffee hours outdoors this summer, so we can have opportunities to reconnect with one another.
- We encourage everyone who can be vaccinated to do so! If you need transportation or support of any nature to make this possible, please contact the church office (920-437-9266). This is how we will accelerate our journey to a healthy, safe, robust worship service when we will all be back to singing our praises to the Lord aloud and together.

Union Church Welcomes New Members

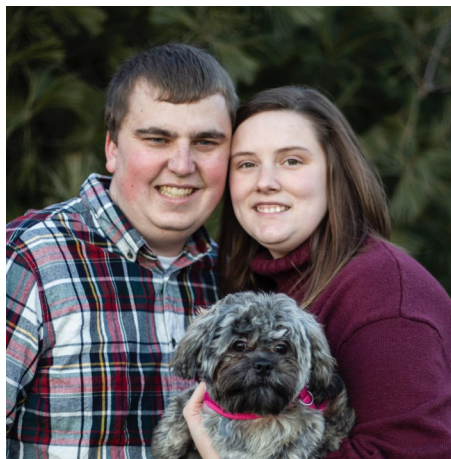
Six new members were welcomed to the faith and fellowship of Union Church on Sunday, May 9.

The Famerees live in De Pere and enjoy hiking and family movie nights. They look forward to strengthening their faith as members of the Union family.

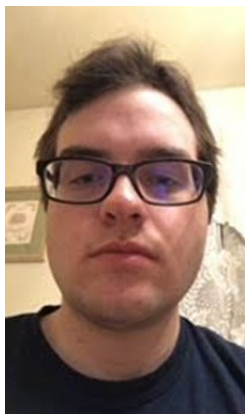


Zak Krueger and JoHanna Beal

Our All-Church Retreat is a weekend of fun, fellowship, and reflection. It is a great place to worship, discuss and enjoy camaraderie with friends of all ages. At this time, we're HOPING that it will be healthy for us to gather for this beloved Union tradition.

The retreat takes place at Moon Beach Camp which is in St. Germain just west of Eagle River and is part of the Outdoor Ministry program of the United Church of Christ. It sits on the shores of Moon Lake and Little Saint Germain Lake. Cabins overlook Moon Lake, and each is furnished, heated, and has a bathroom with a shower. There is a beautiful lodge, and the camp is fully staffed with helpful people. The camp offers the peaceful quiet of northern Wisconsin amongst the native pine, oak and birch trees.

People arrive throughout the evening on Friday, partaking of snacks and fellowship time around the lodge fireplace. We are treated to three meals on Saturday and brunch on Sunday. 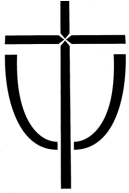

**RESPECTING THE MINISTRY OF COLLEAGUES:
ETHICAL GUIDELINES FOR MINISTERS AND CHURCHES
NORTHEAST ASSOCIATION, WISCONSIN CONFERENCE
UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST**

When a clergyperson (or other authorized or licensed minister) has concluded ministry with a congregation, either through retirement or by accepting a call to a new parish, that person is no longer authorized to perform pastoral services for members of the former congregation. To do so is a violation of ministerial ethics and can damage the integrity, growth, and health of the local church. In order to honor these ethical boundaries and to protect churches and clergy from unnecessary conflict, clergy are expected to adhere to the following guidelines:

BAPTISMS, WEDDINGS, FUNERALS

The former pastor may not conduct weddings, funerals or baptisms for members of that congregation, within or without the church building, unless specifically invited to share in such a service by the current pastor or interim. Even when so invited, the role of the former pastor shall generally be that of participant, with the new pastor serving as primary officiant. Should a member of the congregation initiate contact with the former pastor about such a service, that person should be urged to discuss the matter with the current pastor.

PASTORAL CARE, COUNSEL AND VISITATION

The former pastor should refrain from visitation or counsel with church members in situations where the current minister has responsibility for their pastoral care; crisis, illness, hospitalization, death, etc. Should the former pastor wish to make such a visit, the current pastor should be consulted prior to the contact. In such a circumstance, a former pastor must exercise extreme care not to permit the proper role of a friend to blur with that of a pastor. The former pastor must also scrupulously avoid offering counsel to members of the congregation who seek it, formally or informally. Such persons should be steered towards their current pastor.

EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR THE CHURCH AND ITS NEW PASTOR

A former pastor must never engage in conversation about the work of the current pastor, comment about the life of the congregation, or express criticism of the new pastor's ministry, personal character, or family. It is inappropriate to offer one's successor advice, counsel or information about members, unless it is first requested. If the former minister continues to live in the community where the congregation is located, it is recommended that he/she transfer membership to another congregation and become an active member there. If this is not possible, every effort should be made to worship outside the congregation for at least a year after the new pastor is installed. If membership in the church previously served is retained, the former pastor should not accept positions of leadership in the congregation without the blessings of the current pastor. At all times, the former pastor should strive to be affirming and supportive of the pastor.

REGARDING THE FORMER MINISTER'S SPOUSE

Often the spouse of the former minister served as an active and vital member of the congregation, perhaps taking leadership roles or even serving on the church staff. That spouse should observe the same guidelines as the former minister. If he or she has served as a member of the church staff, that position should be resigned. Spouses must realize that their comments and criticisms, no matter how innocent or well-intended, can create harm in the life of the congregation as surely as those of the former minister.

ADOPTING STRATEGIES

TO SUPPORT YOUR SUCCESSOR AND FORMER CONGREGATION

The most helpful gift you can give to your successor and former congregation is to make a clear farewell statement at the conclusion of your ministry. Entrust your former members to the care of the new pastor or interim, and likewise ask that the congregation offer their prayers and support to him/her. Make it clear that while you will hold the congregation in your thoughts and prayers and continue to cherish your friendships with them, you can no longer serve as their pastor. Let them know that you are establishing such boundaries not because you are abandoning them, but out of love and respect for the church.

PUBLIC MINISTRY IN THE COMMUNITY

The former minister must be very careful about the public role in the wider community associated with the pastoral office. Ideally one should refrain from offering prayers at public meetings or civic events. When such a request is made, suggest that it would be well to invite your successor to do so, as this can help the ministry of the new pastor become recognized beyond the congregation. Likewise, the former pastor should be very cautious about officiating at weddings and funerals for non-members in settings other than the church; such services can offer important possibilities for ministry and evangelism for the new pastor.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CONGREGATION

Members of the congregation who cherish their relationship with the former minister must realize that any requests they make for pastoral services put him or her in a painful double bind, for it is hard to refuse such a request, yet it is a violation of clergy ethics to assent. All members of the body of Christ must honor these important boundaries and fully invest their trust in the person called by the congregation to serve as their pastor.
